

Lesson 5: Hitting Doesn't Improve Behavior



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Improve - to get better, or to make something better.	<i>Her grades have improved greatly this semester.</i>
Problem - something that causes difficulty or that is hard to deal with.	<i>He has a serious health problem.</i>

Dialogue Reading:

Lisa: Oh! That's all. Yes I know about that. And I'm trying to take care of it, because I don't want my son to grow up bad. I already talked to James about it.

Venn: That's good Lisa. I hope James will stop hitting your son so that he won't do the things he's doing now.
